Out in the garden



Water restrictions in place during the summer months and crops are struggling to survive?

Consequence is, cost for food will increase. Plenty of this going on world wide already and more forecasted. Why not use the summer months to set up your rainwater collection system and start your journey towards self sufficiency.

Storing and collecting rainwater when available is a great way to ensure you can grow your own veggies and keep cost for food down. But there seems to be more to rainwater. Why is it that we can turn on the irrigation in the garden if we are lucky enough to have this option and veggies and co grow ok but as soon as the rain has stopped the plants seem to grow so much quicker in comparison?

There are 4 reasons why that is.

1) Rainwater lacks the minerals usually found in irrigation water. The absence of minerals makes the rainwater better at pulling nutrients off of the soil binding sites so plants can use them.

2) Rainwater has generally a lower pH level (acidic) which is helpful in areas with alkaline soil.

3) Raindrops fall about 20 MPH while irrigation droplets fall at about 5 MPH, because of this raindrops provide better soil penetration.

4) Rainwater is saturated with air, so it helps oxygenate and aerate the rootzone much better than irrigation water.

Rainwater is precious therefore should be collected wherever possible and used in the garden. The system doesn't have to be expensive as the picture shows, even 1 drum is a good start.

Yes the penetration and the aeration aspect of rain are hard to copy but there are tools in the shed, which can help promote healthy soil and living conditions.

These tools are called forks, gypsum and cover cropping. It is possible to improve the aeration and penetration of the soil through using cover crops over the winter months such as radishes, oats, mustards, lupins or sunflowers, linseed, phacelia etc. over summer months. Applying a bit of gypsum from time to time and loosening the soil manually using a fork in tight areas is also possible.


