Direct drilling and other No till farming cultivation techniques have become very popular over the last couple years, this for good reason. It saves time, it's said to work well in challenging conditions, it's cost effective and benefits to the environment due to lower energy inputs and impact on soil as habitat. Direct drilling is also excellent for erosion control.

This spring we have been called out more than once to have a look at why the paddock has failed to establish after being sown using above described technique. With all the pros in mind lets talk about the disadvantages of direct

One disadvantage is that due to crop residue cover soils dry up more slowly and temperatures in the soil are lower. If crop rotation is not adequate, then the risk of some diseases that remain in the crop residue can increase. The amount of perennial weeds can also increase using this technique.

In the conventional system, a direct drill is used to sow seed into an uncultivated paddock after the existing pasture has been killed by herbicide. This practice can create different problems- the choice of chemical or residue chemical left in the spray gear can cause newly emerging plants to terminate.

Another fact is that the nutrient concentration close to the soil surface will increase when soil is not mixed (ploughed), because of that there is a higher risk of leaching of soluble nutrients. Adding Lime, manure and other soil amendments is limited.

Direct drills can create channels in the soil in which slugs and other insects can easily hide during the day. Slugs love fresh new shoots and can be devastating - an easy way to check numbers is to place a sack or two in the middle of the field and to count slug numbers in the morning.

Direct drilling and No till cultivation are a great way to renew an old pasture, or plant your next crop but they aren't always successful and good old ploughing should be considered from time to time.

Birds are helpful insectivores and entertainers

One of the best insect eaters in NZ is the Silvereye/ Waxeye. How to attract birds like the Silvereye, Fantails and others back into our garden?
